# **OUR PURPOSE**

Continence NZ was established to provide information and education about continence to people with continence problems, caregivers, health professionals and the public.

From small beginnings, our annual public awareness campaign has developed into an effective method of promoting awareness of continence problems and encouraging access to professional help.

We also run an 0800 helpline, provide both community and professional education, along with popular Pelvic Floor Focus workshops for fitness trainers, and offer a website packed with information and advice.

#### **OUR STRUCTURE**

We are a not-for-profit, registered as an incorporated society. We are governed by an Executive Committee with four Board meetings per annum. We have a President, Secretary and Treasurer as office holders, and up to six other Executive Committee members. We produce annual audited accounts.

#### MAIN SOURCES OF CASH AND RESOURCES

We receive funding from the Ministry of Health to operate our 0800 helpline and website. However this needs to be supplemented with revenue from grant and trust funding. All sources of funding are critical for our organisation. We also receive funding from corporate sponsorship.

## MAIN METHODS USED TO RAISE FUNDS

We raise money through grant and trust applications, and through corporate sponsorship.

## **RELIANCE ON VOLUNTEERS AND DONATED GOODS OR SERVICES**

Our Executive Committee members are volunteers, and we rely on volunteer speakers for our education days.

# FROM OUR PRESIDENT

# **DR ANNA LAWRENCE**



We reflect on another challenging year with the Omicron outbreak shaping the early months of 2022. Our small team remains resourceful, resilient and committed to increasing awareness and providing education and advocacy for those living with incontinence in Aotearoa.

Continence NZ receives a small proportion of the funding required from the Ministry of Health. The team has done an incredible job of securing additional funding and growing our organisation in a challenging environment. Omicron and the natural disasters in Auckland and Hawke's Bay have impacted this year's results. We are grateful to all our funders for their ongoing support of this important work.

In the middle of the year, we welcomed a new CEO, Laura Fear. Our previous CEO, Louise Judd, stepped down to support family members with complex health needs, and remains with Continence NZ as our Funding and Planning Manager. I would like to thank Louise for her exceptional leadership, passion and dedication as CEO, and for her continued service to the organisation.

New Zealand's ageing population and increasing demand for health services is increasing pressure on continence services around the country. Increasingly we hear that containment is becoming the focus of public continence services over treatment and prevention. This ignores the significant quality-of-life impacts of incontinence on those who experience this very treatable medical condition and their whānau, as well as the societal costs, such as early rest home admission as a result of carer stress, increased risks of falls and preventable hospital admissions from incontinence that is not properly treated.

Our recently completed Service Review and Research Project highlights the costs associated with incontinence in New Zealand. With the environmental cost of just disposing of incontinence products estimated at \$14.9 million per year, incontinence is a significant and growing issue for New Zealand. An estimated investment of \$6.4 million per year into Pelvic Health Nurses and Pelvic Health Physiotherapists would result in \$8.9 million in savings, producing a net benefit of \$2.5 million per year. More importantly, it would support New Zealanders to live their best lives free from the economic, social and personal burdens of incontinence.

Our members play a critical role in ensuring patients receive the treatments they need and supporting them through their treatment pathways for incontinence. Thank you for your efforts in educating, advocating and supporting patients to receive treatments that can be life-changing, resolving more than 'wet pants', by freeing them from the social and financial impacts of living with incontinence.

# REPORT FROM OUR CEO

# **LAURA FEAR**

It has been my privilege to join the Continence NZ team in 2022, taking over from outgoing CEO Louise Judd. Louise has moved into a part time role as Funding and Planning Manager, to allow her to care for family members with complex health needs. I would like to thank Louise for her years of passion and dedication as CEO, for her guidance in the early months of my time at Continence NZ and for her ongoing service to the organisation.

The ongoing challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic and the Omicron outbreak continued to play a significant role in the 2022/2023 financial year, especially in the first half of the year. Our call volumes remained high, and the numbers of those seeking support increased. In the second half of the financial year, we were able to begin to provide more face-to-face education opportunities again, and likewise start our Service Review and Research project, looking at the experiences of those living with incontinence in New Zealand. These research findings are now available on the Lotteries Commission website. Thank you to all who participated in this research, giving their time and sharing their journeys to help us serve New Zealanders as best we can.

We also began the planning phase for our Continence NZ National Conference which was held on 14th and 15th September 2023. It was a pleasure to see so many of our members there. Thank you for your support.

During World Continence Week 2022, 20 to 26 June, we focused on supporting tamariki and teens. We had a special video message from Jason Gunn for all the whānau out there struggling with bladder and bowel issues. Our World Continence Week video with this message was viewed more than 46,000 times. We also created a digital resource pack full of information, links and resources to help get people chatting about continence, which was emailed to more than 5,000 people and organisations as well as printed resource packs for health professionals. We also encouraged people to host Wee Chats around the country. These included conversations at school, within church groups, by hospital staff, pelvic health physiotherapists, fitness trainers and among whānau (family).

Calls to our helpline increased by 81% during World Continence Week, and we enjoyed hearing about the various events hosted around the country. A sincere thank you to those who supported the campaign.

Toni Horan joined us in mid-2022 as Education and Communications Manager. Toni has led the way for us on the development of online courses and resources. These are available free to our members via our website.

September 2022 marked a significant milestone for Continence NZ - our 30th Birthday! While Omicron prevented the party this milestone deserved, we took time to reflect on 30 years of helpline calls, awareness campaigns, community education sessions and professional development opportunities for our members. We are grateful for the support of our funders, members and community over the past 30 years.

This year has also led to changes in our Executive Committee and team.

We were pleased to welcome two new Executive Committee members following our AGM in 2022, Jacinta Townsend and Helen Peek. Jacinta is a Nurse Practitioner with over 25 years' experience in urology. She qualified as a Nurse Practitioner in 2015 with Distinction. Her training includes male and female voiding dysfunction, bladder cancer diagnosis and surveillance, prostate cancer assessment and surveillance, in addition to other common benign urological conditions. Jacinta runs independent flexible cystoscopy and urodynamics clinics. She established her own consulting company four years ago and now works across both the public and private sectors. Her passion is providing evidence-based nursing practice, and she has published several research articles.

Helen is a Continence Nurse Specialist at Southland DHB and previously served on our Executive from 2009 to 2021. She completed her nursing training at Timaru Hospital before moving south. All of her nursing career has been in Invercargill, so she very proudly calls herself a Southlander. Helen worked in paediatrics and aged care before becoming a Continence Nurse Specialist, a role she truly enjoys. She completed her Master's Degree with a dissertation exploring women's perceptions and understanding of the pelvic floor.

Helen now works alongside other health professionals creating education packages for primary healthcare providers, focusing on recognising and managing those affected by surgical mesh, and preventing and managing urinary incontinence and pelvic organ prolapse.

Both Jacinta and Helen have been incredibly valuable additions to our Executive Committee. In the first half of 2023, we also farewelled two significant members of our team.

Lisa Smith, our Children's Continence Nurse has left Continence NZ to focus on her private continence clinic in the Hawke's Bay. While we miss having her as part of our team, we are thrilled that Lisa continues to collaborate with us on projects as the opportunities arise. We also farewelled Louise Mills, who has left us to work in aged residential care in her local community. Her knowledge in continence management will be a huge asset to her local community. We are grateful to Lisa and Louise for their service to the organisation.

I would also like to thank our significant funders, Lotteries New Zealand, the Ministry of Health, the IHC Foundation and the Lindsay Foundation, for their ongoing commitment to our work. Thank you to our members for their support.

# **REPORT**

# 4 FROM OUR TREASURER

The budget for the financial year ending 31 March 2023 indicated an expected surplus of \$10,693. However, our financial position at the close of the financial year was a deficit of \$135,192.

A number of factors have contributed to the deficit, including the pause of Continence NZ's corporate sponsor programme, changes in funder priorities and delays in funder decisions due to natural disasters, as well as the impacts of Omicron on the organisation. Additionally, \$67,332 in unused grants has been carried forward to the 2023/2024 financial year. Cashflow projections for the coming 12 months and half year results for 2023/2024 are positive, showing a net profit of \$96,000 as at 30 June 2024, as the organisation continues to work towards further diversifying its funding sources.

Continence NZ continues to demonstrate the ability to raise additional funding and deliver significant value to our community.

Total revenue for the 2022/2023 financial year was \$370,760, a increase of 13.4% when compared with the 2021/2022 financial year.

Total expenditure for the 2022/2023 financial year was \$505,953, an increase of 34.3% when compared with the 2021/2022 financial year. This increase in costs is due to the investment in two critical roles for the organisation, our Education and Communications Manager and our Funding and Planning Manager. Both roles continue to deliver significant benefit to the organisation.

Charity Integrity Audit completed the audit of our accounts for the year ended 31 March 2023, and it is proposed that we retain their services for the audit of accounts for the financial year ending 31 March 2024.

# INTRODUCING OUR 6 ONLINE EDUCATION

This year, we expanded our online course offerings and now have modules suitable for healthcare professionals, aged care workers, parents, carers, disability support workers, teachers and teacher aides who support people with their continence needs.

Our newest KEY Continence Training programmes were designed for anyone in the education and/or disability fields supporting people with additional physical, sensory, developmental, learning and/or behavioural needs.

The overall aim of our modules is to give learners practical knowledge and tools to support the people they work with to achieve their best level of continence and improve their overall quality of life.

Since expanding our course offerings, we have seen an increase in enrolments. We expect this to grow as we continue to add courses and promote these to the community.

In recent surveys of Continence NZ members and the community, results show that most of those who have accessed these courses have found them to be "very useful", and a number have commented that online education was one of the most helpful supports that they received from Continence NZ.

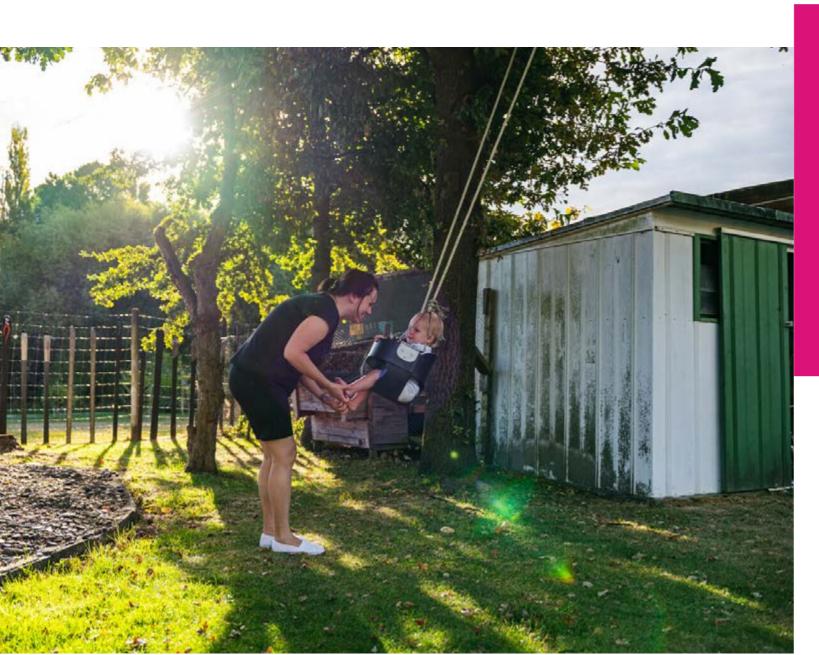

# **CURRENT SITUATION**



Incontinence continues to be a culturally sensitive topic in New Zealand, particularly for Māori, Pasifika and older people. When Kiwis do seek continence care, they find it difficult to navigate the system, feel they are not being heard, and experience significantly variable service provision and wait times depending on where they are in the country. Positive trends in continence care include slightly more people asking for help, and the shift of focus from cleaning and containment to education and treatment.

# **Statement of Accounting Policies**

# New Zealand Continence Association Incorporated trading as Continence NZ For the year ended 31 March 2023

#### **Basis of Preparation**

The entity is eligible to and has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future. All amounts are presented in New Zealand dollars and are rounded to the nearest dollar.

#### Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

#### Income Tax

New Zealand Continence Association Incorporated trading as Continence NZ is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

#### Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 12 months or less.

#### Revenue Recognition

Revenue is accounted for as follows:

**Goods and Services** - Revenue from providing goods or services is recognised when the goods are sold or by reference to the stage of completion of service.

**Donations, Grants and Fundraising Income** - Donations, Grants and Fundraising income are accounted for depending on whether they have been provided with a "use or return" condition attached or not. Where no use or return conditions are attached, they are recorded as income when the cash is received. Where donations, grants and fundraising include a use or return condition, they are initially recorded as a liability on receipt. The donation, grant and fundraising is subsequently recognised within the Statement of Financial Performance as the performance conditions are met. Donated goods or services (other than donated assets) are not recognised. Where significant donated assets are received with useful lives of 12 months or more, and the fair value of the asset is readily obtainable, the donation is recorded at the value of the asset obtained. Where the fair value of the asset is not readily obtainable, the donation is not recorded. Donated assets with useful lives less than 12 months are not recorded.

**Other Income** - All other income is accounted for on an accruals basis and accounting for in accordance with the substance of the transaction

Interest income - Interest income is recognised as and when it is earned.

#### Expenditur

Expenses are recognised when the cost is incurred, with prepaid expenses deferred at the amount relating to the future goods or services to be received.

#### **Trade Receivables**

Trade Receivables are recognised at estimated realisable value. Bad Debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

# Property, Plant & Equipment





Property, Plant & Equipment is recognised at cost less aggregate depreciation. Historical cost includes expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition of assets, and includes the cost of replacements that are eligible for capitalisation when these are incurred.

All other repairs & maintenance are recognised as expenses in the Statement of Financial Performance in the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation has been calculated using the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 2007.

#### **Operating Leases**

Operating lease payments, where the lessors effectively retain substantially all of the risks and benefits of ownership of the lease items, are recognised in the determination of the operating surplus in equal installments over the lease term.

#### Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.
